3. To receive the Chairperson's & Vice Chairperson's Report:

1. Awareness Workshop - 28 February 2024

Infrastructure theft in South Africa continues to be a significant challenge, affecting industries ranging from telecommunications and energy to public services and manufacturing. In light of the increasing prevalence of this crime, the **Combined Private Investigations (CPI)** and **Metal Recycling Association (MRA)** took proactive steps by organizing a **Training and Information Workshop** held **28 February 2024**.

This workshop focused on the following key areas:

• Current trends in infrastructure theft: Analysis of how this crime has evolved in recent years, including statistics on affected industries and regions.

- **Techniques used in infrastructure theft**: A detailed review of the tactics criminals are employing to dismantle and sell critical infrastructure, such as copper cables, transformers, and other high-value metal components.
- **Countermeasures**: Presentations on technological, physical, and regulatory solutions to combat these crimes. This will include insights from security experts, law enforcement representatives, and industry leaders.
- Collaboration between public and private sectors: Discussions on how private industries, government agencies, and law enforcement can better work together to curb this crime.

Infrastructure theft not only causes direct financial loss to affected businesses but also has broader economic consequences, including job losses, production downtime, and public safety risks.

We are confident that the insights shared during this workshop will be invaluable in the fight against infrastructure theft, which continues to present significant risks to the sustainability and security of various industries across South Africa. Awareness also highlights the significant role the recycling industry plays in the fight against crime.

2. Second-Hand Goods Act (SHGA) Update - Comments and Amendments

On 11 August 2024, the Civilian Secretariat for Police Service released proposed amendments to the Second-Hand Goods Regulations, which govern dealers and recyclers under the Second-Hand Goods Act (Act No. 6 of 2009).

This Act plays a critical role in regulating the trade of second-hand goods and recycled materials, particularly in preventing the illegal sale of stolen goods, which often includes metals and other valuable materials sourced through infrastructure theft.

The key objectives of the proposed amendments are:

- Enhancing record-keeping requirements: Dealers will be required to maintain more comprehensive records of their transactions, including details of the seller, goods sold, and documentation to prove ownership.
- Stricter controls on buyers and sellers: Greater scrutiny will be placed on the legitimacy of sellers and buyers of second-hand goods, with a view to reduce the flow of stolen property into the market.
- **Improved oversight by authorities**: The amendments will provide clearer guidelines on the responsibilities of law enforcement in overseeing compliance with the regulations.

The MRA submitted comments to the prosed amendments, highlighting amongst others, the lack of consultation in the drafting of the proposed amendments. The MRA was a vital role player in the drafting of the current Act, which has served the industry well for more than a decade.

We are also awaiting the **finalization of exemptions** under the **Second-Hand Goods Act**, which will provide specific provisions for certain sectors and clarify operational boundaries for recyclers and dealers in the market. Once signed, these exemptions will further enhance regulatory oversight and compliance.

3. Free Trade and the Price Preference System (PPS)

The **Price Preference System (PPS)**, now in its **11th year**, continues to be a cornerstone of the regulatory framework governing the trade of scrap metal in South Africa. This system was introduced to prioritize local buyers over international markets, ensuring that local industries that depend on recycled metals are not deprived of critical raw materials.

By governments own admission in gazette notice 44037 – 24 December 2020:

"The Amended Export Control Guidelines on the Exportation of Ferrous and Non-ferrous Waste and Scrap as contained in Government Gazette Number 43765, Notice 532 of 2020 dated 2 October 2020 are herewith extended and will remain in force, in accordance with the Minister's Policy Directive, until 31 July 2021 or the date on which the export duty/tax on the exportation of scrap metal is fully implemented at a rate that is higher than 0 % (zero percent), as approved by Parliament, whichever date comes first."

The PPS had not achieved the desired effect and was to be replaced by an export duty. As we know, we now have both policies running concurrently, which has given rise to the abuse of the system by a number of role players, due to the ambiguity of the system and lack of clear definitions.

PPS Guidelines under review: As of 2024, a formal review of the PPS guidelines is underway. The purpose of the review is *per No. 51283 GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, 27 SEPTEMBER 2024*

"The International Trade Administration Commission of South Africa (ITAC or the Commission) is embarking on a review of the Amended Export Control Guidelines on the Exportation of Ferrous a n d Non-Ferrous Waste and Scrap (the Guidelines) issued in connection with the Price Preference System for waste and scrap metals (PPS).

The purpose of this review is to determine how the overall effectiveness and efficiency of the PPS might be improved. In connection with its review, ITAC is seeking public comment, in particular on the issues identified in the Discussion section below. (refer to gazette notice for further information)."

We encourage all members and stakeholders in the recycling industries to comment on this review, as any changes will likely impact operations, especially regarding export procedures and local market supply.

Conclusion

2024 has been an extremely difficult year. With several initiatives and legislative developments, enhance regulation of second-hand goods, and ensure the sustainability of the metal recycling industry.

However, much work remains to be done, and the success of these efforts hinges on active participation and collaboration across all sectors. We strongly encourage all members to:

- Support any future workshops on infrastructure theft to contribute to the solutions being discussed.
- Stay up to date with changes to the Price Preference System and Second Hand Goods Act, especially in light of the ongoing review process.

Thank you for your continued commitment to safeguarding the integrity of our industry through your membership of the MRA, a SAPS accredited association.

The decrease in expenses, has been due to various factors that the Exco took into consideration, where the current financial position of the MRA resulted in all expenses being reviewed and reduced substantially where possible. The MRA currently no longer makes use of any additional Consultants, and our legal expenses have been reduced, we have also aimed at moving as many meetings to online/ email as possible.

The MRA has made provision that the next financial period will follow a similar expense pattern; which allows us to aim towards having one-year annual expenses provisioned, as per our constitution by the end of the next Financial Year, should we receive no further claims against the MRA.
